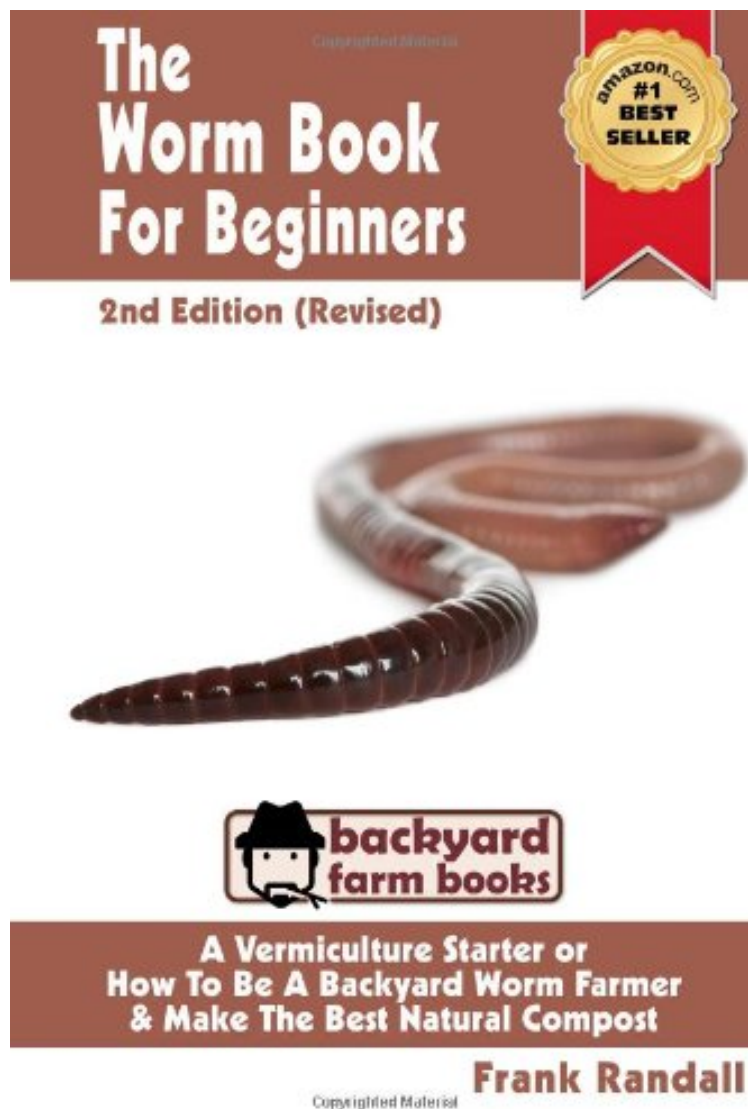

It was some help but after working with the worms for a while - didn't get the book for 3-4 weeks after the worms came, there are things that I learned from the worms that were not in the book, that I wished was in the book. A line drawing of worm anatomy would have been useful. Harvesting the worm castings is tricky and I could have used some suggestions on how to minimize the trauma to the worms - these worms are a lot more fragile than our husky native earthworms. The author should have covered the concern by environmentalists in regard to this non-native species causing havoc with our native fauna if people get tired of them and throw them out in the forest, roadside, or in their garden/compost heap. Research is showing a negative impact on native species of worms and plants.
